View exchange meeting for extension of pre-pri educational programme

A day-long opinion exchange meeting titled, 'GO-NGO Collaboration Guideline and Implementation on Primary Education' was held at the LGED Auditorium (level-2) at LGED Building on 19 December, 2012. The view exchange meeting was held under management of Dhaka Ahsania Mission, Dhaka regional secretariat of Bangladesh ECD Network (BEN) and joint collaboration

of the Primary Education Directorate, BEN and Mass Literacy Campaign. The meeting was aimed at making people aware about the process of implementation of planning and policy formulated for extension of the pre-primary educational programme. The chairperson of BEN, Dr Manjur Ahmed, presided over the meeting while it was attended by the additional secretary of the ministry of primary and mass education, S M Ashraful Islam. The director (policy & operation) of Primary Education Directorate, Faruque Jalil, read out the key-note paper. DAM executive Director Dr M Ehsanur Rahman delivered the welcome address. Speakers said the importance of primary education is immense in attainment of standard education. The NGOs have been running over 30,000 pre-primary schools across the country for the purpose. It is worth mentioning that the ministry of primary and mass education already approved the pre-primary education collaboration guideline. The ministry did this considering the far-reaching influence of pre-primary education. An implementation procedure has also been developed. Alongside government, the NGOs will be able to implement the pre-primary education programme if the plan is materialised. ECD Network and Mass Literacy Campaign will organize opinion exchange meetings in nine regions of Bangladesh.

been implementing various programmes for reducing ill effects of passive smoking by keeping public places free from smoking, according to tobacco products control law of 2005.

doctors are required in each prison but now there is only one doctor. Various issues on prevention of AIDS in prisons, review of entire activities, current situation, ways to get rid of the situation were discussed in four sessions of the seminar.

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Human trafficking: The worst form of HR violations

Attention to psychosocial counselling as part of rehabilitation programmes for vulnerable and trauma-exposed groups can be traced back to late 20th century when human rights organisations while delivering services to disfranchised women and children recognised the importance and need of counselling. Several national and international organisations took initiatives to incorporate psychosocial counselling in their helping component of multi-sector holistic approach from identification to recovery and integration of survivors of domestic violence, sexual abuse, exploitation and trafficking. Repeated natural and man-made hazards of the days also call forth the need of counselling for crisis intervention. At the beginning, unskilled personnel with little or no training were providing services. Due to lack of formal training facilities for counselors, short-term trainings were provided to build capacity and resources to work at field level. Many misconceptions encircle the term

'counselling'. The job title "counselor" was loosely used in many cases where most of their tasks are limited to guidance and advice. Most of the personnel involved in service delivery used to claim to do counselling. Job description of a counselor was not clearly delineated and often involved managerial role to act as a corrective or motivator role. They were often held responsible and considered as a last resort to persuade or influence recipient to reach the goal of the organisation. There were fall short of proper setting for maintaining confidentiality and provision of supervision to ensure ethical practice crucial to effective service delivery. Unicef (2000) also reported that although many organisations have, by name, included such service within their programmes, these programmes rarely correspond to common notion of what psychosocial counselling should be. Nevertheless, existence of such practices indicated a need or desire for forms of assistance that focuses on psychological

wellbeing. In response to growing need for skilled counsellors, there is a constant demand for adequate training programmes.

In 1996 with the advent of clinical PSYCHOLOGY department, counselling services were formally established at the Student Counselling and Guidance Centre of Dhaka University. This has set a milestone for counselling service in educational institutions. Later with the initiation of professional course of educational psychology in 2006 and counselling psychology in 2009, psychological services were further extended to various schools and child development clinics. Thereon medical institutions, private schools and NGOs started recruiting counselors. To meet the growing demands of helping people to have a meaningful, satisfying life, adequately trained professional counselors are indispensable. Subsequently, long term structured trainings in counselling were initiated at organisational and institutional levels.

Human trafficking: The worst form of HR violations

Magnitude of Trafficking: There is no doubt that human trafficking is the worst form of human rights (HR) violations. Women and children generally fall victims of trafficking. It is a criminal act prevalent all over the world from early period of civilisation. In recent time, the issue of human trafficking has become a major social and political concern across the world including Bangladesh.

According to a report of the International Labour Organisation (ILO), some 200,000 to 250,000 women and children are annually trafficked to various countries of Southeast Asia while over one million children are trafficked elsewhere around the world (ILO, 2002). Generally, trafficked women and children are destined to do forced labour, commercial sexual exploitation or domestic enslavement. As per a report of the government of Bangladesh, over 13,000 children had been trafficked from the country over the last five years.

Cross border trafficking is treated as illegal migration. Study shows that not only low income, socially deprived people are affected but poverty-stricken countries around the world are most vulnerable. Human traffickers are very active in Nepal and Bangladesh, two poverty-stricken countries of South Asia

(along with Sri Lanka). Poverty is seen as the key factor where poor families are compelled to sell their children to traffickers (Dottridge, 2002). Boys are also trafficked to Middle Eastern countries for using as camel jockey. Organs and bones of Bangladeshi boys are also in great demand in Indian medical colleges.

Impact of Trafficking: Trafficking has multi-dimensional facet. Besides violence against women and children, it also poses developmental and economic concern with far-fetching regional and societal consequences. Trafficked women and children are often subjected to sexual exploitation and therefore especially vulnerable to health consequences of sexual violence. Trafficking also brings about change in their living condition typified with extreme dependency. They survive in a clandestine and promiscuous situation in a different unknown society outside their own social and cultural safety networks (Tudorache, 2004). These traumatic experiences of trafficking have direct hazardous physical and mental health consequences on the victims. The psychological effects can be devastating to young people and aggravated by humiliation and detrimental social circumstances after returning home. It can also pose a threat and affects public

health. The human and economic costs of unattended health problems of trafficked people, particularly in flesh trade and given the often unsanitary conditions under which trafficked people work and live, are immeasurable (US Department of State, 2005).

Mental health consequences of trafficking: Psychosomatic reactions found in trafficked person can be considered as a normal reaction to abnormal event like the traumas of trafficking experience.

Trafficking experience of children are persistently threatening and in danger of chronic physical and sexual violence that will put their future development at risk. According to Zimmerman (2003), persistent abuse can affect a child's psychological development and can cause pathological personality development. For example, children learn to "survive," feeling compelled, while they are abused, to form attachments and to develop trust with their criminal caretakers. After all, children tend to trust adult caretakers, comply with authority figures and blame themselves or feel guilty for what others impose on them. The trafficking experience has potential disastrous effect on their future capacity to form healthy relationship based on mutual trust and intimacy. In general, the younger the child, the more devastating is the impact of abuse. Low self-esteem, poor interpersonal skills, anxiety, isolation, induced psychotic thinking, aggressive and/or hypersexual behaviour, learning disabilities, substance abuse, suicidal tendencies are but a few of the potential consequences of child sexual abuse and illustrate the devastating dysfunctional effects of trafficking on children.

This is why, long-term work in multidisciplinary teams involving psychotherapists, psychiatrists, physicians, social workers, police and social services is required to address the psychosocial need of trafficked women and children at every stage of identification to recovery to integration.

However, the existence of structures and laws mean nothing without improved attitude towards and respectful perception of survivors so that women and process of rehabilitation become humanised, rather than over-criminalised or scandalised.
